SUBSCRIPTIONS.

It is more than seven years since the membership subscription to the Heather Society was last raised to £3.00 per annum. Inflation, with increased printing costs and postage rates, has now created a situation in which the Year Book and Bulletin absorb most of the annual subscription and leave very little for the administration and other expenses of the Society. The Council has reluctantly come to the decision that an increase in the subscription is inevitable. A resolution will therefore be put to the next Annual General Meeting of the Society proposing that an increase in the membership subscription should become effective from 1st January 1987. In deciding what rate to recommend, the Council took into account the effect that any increase in subscription always has on membership numbers, the rate of inflation that is likely in the next few years and the desirability of fixing a realistic rate, which will not need to be raised again for several years. The Council also considered the current subscription rates of other societies. In the light of these considerations the Council decided to propose that the subscription for a single member should be £6.00 per annum, and that for a family membership/membership for an organisation should be £7.00 per annum. A Resolution to this effect will be included in the Agenda for the Annual General Meeting, which will be circulated with the summer issue of the Bulletin.

Mr. Victor Russ 1905 — 1985

Victor Russ, a retired banker who was the Society's Hon. Auditor from 1978 to 1984, died peacefully in his sleep at his Harrogate home in May 1985. Many members will have met him at our 8th Conference at Losehill Hall — he had also been present at Grantley Hall in 1971. Living so close to Harlow Car, he acquired an intimate knowledge of the Gardens and the plants, especially heathers which gave him so much pleasure. When the Harlow Car Project was in its infancy in 1968, Victor was one of the four volunteers living near enough to undertake the careful listing of the first 4,000 heathers grown in the nursery beds at Harlow Car, which later formed the basis of the vast heather rock garden there, designed by Geoffrey Smith.

In response to a letter from a member saying "The Society should produce a handbook---of all the heathers recognised by the Society as distinct, giving awards for plants of outstanding merit", John Ardron announced in the 1970 Year Book "We are indeed fortunate that four of our members --- have volunteered to do this recording". Thus the growth history of selected cultivars was begun. Of the original team, Victor Russ alone continued and was joined by 8 others. They worked with meticulous care in all weathers over the four years of the official Heather Trials, the results of which have become a most valuable publication. As both Hon. Auditor and recorder, Victor Russ gave unstintingly of his time and made a most valuable contribution to our Society. We send our appreciation and sympathy to his family and friends.

He will be offering us tea, so it will be helpful if members will kindly let me know if they intend to come — and as early as possible please. With the longer hours of daylight, there will still be time to visit the beach or promenade in the early evening if anyone feels so inclined!

SOUTH WEST.

Despite this, the Erica x darleyensis cultivars are putting on their vivid display and brightening up the winter days.

Looking forward to the spring, the first meeting of the year will be at 2pm on March 22nd at Lytchett Matravers Village Hall, when John Bridgland will give a talk on Heathers'. John has been a member of the Society for many years and is the speaker on heathers for Hampshire Federation of Horticultural Societies in the Southampton area. The talk will be followed by a two class Table Show, the first class being 'A collection of heathers in bloom' and the second 'A collection of heathers shown for foliage effect'. Both classes being shown in a bowl or vase.

Lytchett Matravers is situated 6 miles from Poole and 1 mile west of the A.350 Poole to Blandford road. The village hall is on the west side of the High Street just north of the Rose and Crown Inn. There will be a charge for refreshments and hire of the hall.

Later in the spring, on Saturday 26th April, we will be visiting the garden of Catnap Cottage in Hilton, 7 miles south west of Blandford. The garden belongs to Mrs. M.J. Phillips and is advertised in the publication 'Gardens of England and Wales Open to the Public' and is described as a plantsman's garden. SCRAP BOWL — Titbits of News from Members.

Tree Heath in Madeira. Although I have always known that Erica arborea is truly a tree heath I was quite surprised to see, when recently in Madeira, specimens growing up to 15 or 20 feet with trunks the size of my upper arm. The really astonishing specimen is at Ribiera Frid where a fossilised plant was dug up during road repairs. It is thought to be 800 or 900 years old and stands about 20 feet in height and at least 6 feet in circumference in excellent preservation due I presume to being buried in peat. It is quite a tourist attraction.

<u>Heather Gems</u>. My note on Heather Perfume in last summer's Bulletin prompted Joyce Burfitt to tell me about an intriguing form of costume jewellery, which she came across some years ago, made from heather stems and staghorn. Enquiries have revealed that it is still being made in Scotland. Heathergems jewellery is sold in the Blair Castle Craft Centre, The Old School, Blair Atholl, Pitlochry, Perthshire.

The craft jewellery is made from the wooden stems of heather collected in the hills around Blair Atholl in Perthshire. The heather is taken to the Old Smiddy, where it is dried and then shot blasted to remove the bark. The stems are then impregnated with dyes in a vacuum chamber, and when the colours have been mixed they are formed into a solid block in a

hydraulic press. After this the heatherwood is cut into slices and handshaped into jewellery. Among the articles manufactured are pendants with silver fittings and chains, brooches, earrings, stickpins, rings, cuff-links, kiltpins, bangles, thimbles and paper-knives. The jewellery is sold in more than 20 different countries because it is so unusual.

There appears to be no end to the many uses to which heather can be put.

Immortalized on Porcelain — The Irish Heath. I wonder how many times heathers have been used as the principal motif on porcelain? Not too many, I think, and not with such exquisite skill as in the newly issued Christmas 1985 porcelain plate from Belleek Pottery.

Belleek is a small village at the south-western extremity of Northern Ireland, situated on a ford near the estuary of the River Erne. For over one hundred years, the village has been known world-wide for its magnificent pottery which has specialised in producing parian ware, porcelain with an extraordinary texture and glaze. These plates have a lustrous quality that is close to mother-of-pearl; the ground colour is pale cream and the porcelain is translucent. The Pottery's reputation is built around its craftsmen whose handiwork is most skillfull. Some of the finest Belleek pieces are virtually handwoven baskets of porcelain.

The Christmas plate just issued has as its centre-piece a painting of <u>Erica erigena</u>— actually a sprig of 'Irish Dusk' — painted by Mrs. Wendy Walsh, the award-winning Irish artist who has illustrated several fine books including 'An Irish Florilegium'. The porcelain itself bears a moulded pattern, the design being based on the flower of the heather, so the whole item is a unity.

Mrs. Wendy Walsh was commissioned to prepare designs for four plates — <u>Sorbus hibernica</u> in autumn plumage (Irish whitebeam) appeared on the 1984 plate and this is still available. <u>Rosa hibernica</u> and <u>Inula salicina</u>, the Irish rose and the Irish fleabane, will appear in 1986 and 1987 respectively. The 1985 plate is available from shops in the U.K. which stock Belleek Pottery, or direct from Belleek Pottery Ltd., Belleek, Co. Fermanagh, N. Ireland. The retail price is about U.K. £31.50 (p & p extra). Each plate is packed in a protective box and is accompanied by a card giving information about the plant.

The Christmas plates issued by Belleek Pottery are strictly limited — only 10,000 plates are produced each year and the individual designs are never repeated. Thus they will become much-sought collector's items in years to come. The output of Belleek Pottery is already collected by enthusiasts and there is a Collectors Club with a considerable membership.

Mrs. Walsh's excellent work continues apace, and in the planned second volume of 'An Irish Florilegium' there will be a painting of Erica erigena.
